


## **Bulb Log 5219**

The last Bulb Log of the year seems like a good time to reflect back on the growth in the garden and overall it has been a good year for the plants with our weather reverting to the more typical moderate conditions rather than the very unusual hot dry conditions we experienced in the summer of 2018.

Gardening involves looking forward, planning ahead, learning from the past and correcting any errors we make and never being afraid to undo our mistakes. If you think a plant is in the wrong place move it, if a plant is struggling deduce through observation why that may be - can you manipulate the habitat to improve the situation? I have made many mistakes through the years but as long as I have learned from them then I do not consider it to be an abject failure - it is the case that you can learn more from making mistakes than you can from the successes.

It is often the case that my favourite areas in the garden are those that I have been most recently working on, like the new bed beside the pond which I created a few years ago and have been planting up with some of my favourite genera - it featured as special edition in Bulb Log 4119 – also the area at the southern end of the garden where I cut back the shrubs opening up the ground which has given me a great opportunity for more planting. I also enjoy the more established areas where the plants are allowed to self-sow in a naturalistic way and I am fascinated by the unlikely spots some of the plants choose to grow – for instance I would not have thought to plant Erythroniums between the rocks of a vertical wall.

Working with nature will make us better gardeners, learning to grow the plants that are most suited to our climate and enjoying the plants that require a different climate in other people's gardens.



I took this picture at mid-day on the 22<sup>nd</sup> December, the winter solstice, now the sun will slowly climb in the sky bathing the garden with energy and stimulating the plants into growth.

The Bulb Log started as a one year project now with seventeen (17) years and eight hundred and eighty four (884) logs behind me I am committed to continue through next year.
