## Forrest Medal - Discussion Weekend 2019



## in Grantown on Spey Cyclamen mirabile Shown by Roma Fiddes




Roma confirmed her position as 'Cyclamen Queen' by taking the top award with her large pan of the beautiful Cyclamen mirabile. In previous years she has won the Forrest medal with her Cyclamen rohlfsianum.

For people used to florists' cyclamen with their large gaudy flowers C. mirabile might just be an unexpected gem. It is the essence of delicacy. The flowers and leaves are about 1—1.5cm in diameter. While Roma's plant is delicate palest pink other forms can be darker pink or even pure white. An added attraction and one that distinguishes C. mirabile from its cousin C. cilicium is that the flowers of the former have fine feathering on the top edge of the flower petals.

The species has rounded leaves with slightly scalloped edges. Most strikingly they usually have a striking pink pattern on the top surface enclosing a green Christmas tree pattern. The underside of the leaves are usually purple.

Roma's plant has wonderful leaves demonstrating all the features which led to its specific name. 'mirabile' means "amazing, wondrous, remarkable".
