The Scottish Rock Garden Club Forrest Medal Glasgow 2022 Daphne petraea 'Persebee' Shown by Cyril Lafong



Once again the Forrest medal was awarded to a plant grown by Cyril Lafong. The range of species which he grows to perfection is extraordinary. He says that Daphne is one of his favourite genera, so it was fitting that this time it was awarded to his pan of Daphne petraea 'Persebee'. In the wild Daphne petraea grows on limestone / dolomite cliffs of Monte Baldo on the Eastern side of Lake Garda. Travel there and search if you will but you won't find a specimen like Persebee. In the wild it tends to be much smaller and often has a spreading nature. Cyril's plant was a 10–12 inch undulating dome of perfect tiny flowers. One had to search to see any leaves! Cyril wrote a bit for me about his plant.

"Daphne petraea 'Persebee'. This is an excellent introduction made in 1997 by Peter Erskine initially under the number 97/T13. I remember getting a Forrest Medal at Glasgow some years ago with a D. petraea with that collection number. The plant that got the Forrest on Saturday is a different plant that was grafted onto D. tangutica in 2011. It has been

progressively potted on until now in its current 11" pot where it has been for the last 4 years. The pot is plunged in a sunny place in an alpine house and given occasional half strength feed in the growing season. The compost used is John Innes with added leafmould and grit. It is my favourite of the D. petraea clones currently in cultivation with mid sized deep pink flowers which are produced reliably every year."
