The Scottish Rock Garden Club & The Alpine Garden Society Kendal Show 18 / 3 /17



It would be almost impossible to describe each every superb plant in this show. By superb I mean a Plant which could under 'normal' circumstances win a Forrest Medal. There were perfect plants in pots of all sizes up to the maximum [for an AGS Show] of 36mm [almost 13 inches]. The Best Plant in Show was Cyril Lafong's Trillium rivale 'Purple Heart', which was favourite with a majority of judges. As soon as voting started you could tell which plant was going to win.

Much of the competition came from the single entry in Class 1 for 6 Rock Plants [above] shown by Frank & Barbara Hoyle . Their entry comprised 6 maximum sized pots of 1. Saxifraga 'Coolock Gem', 2. Primula allionii 'Marjorie Wooster', 3. Primula allionii 'Mrs Dyas', 4. Saxifraga 'Cumulus', 5. Primula 'Pink Aire' and 6. Dionysia aretioides. The Dionysia was awarded a certificate of Merit. This entry can only be described as a 'force majeure' - irresistible!





One of the reasons so I like so many other rock gardeners strive to get to the shows early is to get a good choice from the plants on the nursery stands. David Rankin and Ian Christie have a chat before judging. David was working on





Kevock Plants' stand. The other pictures here show the huge range of plants from Aberconwy Nursery, Potterton's Nursery and the hepaticas are from Edrom Nursery. There were at least 6 others but I did not get a picture of them as the crowds built up quickly as members snapped up new plants for their gardens.









The class for 3 pans Papaveraceae or Ranunculaceae revealed just how popular Hepaticas have become while there is still an abiding interest in Corydalis.

Primulas

As usual there were large numbers of great primroses, especially in the 3 pan classes









Most were selections or hybrids of P. allionii, their neat mounds making taller species look a bit ungainly. Spring is the time for plants forming mounds and cushions— P. allionii, saxifrages, Dionysias even the Hepaticas are dome shaped. Even their flower colours are in the same ranges.



Don Peace and Alan Furness take a break from judging. In front of them are Iris lutescens on the left and Iris bucharica 'Baldschuan Yellow'. Competing with tem was the blue Iris nusariensis. This clone has a long history at the Morecambe, Lancaster, Blackpool, Kendal show, back to the days of Wilf Kirby, David Mowle and Duncan Lowe. Below these :-
