

If you do not give us instructions regarding substitution with a prepaid order, please let us know whether you wish the balance to be returned to you or credited to your account.

**COMPLAINTS** can only be considered if made on receipt of the plants.

### THE PLANTSMEN

OUR nursery is a small one run by plantsmen for other plantsmen. We aim to supply all those who have a real appreciation of plants as individuals; adventurous gardeners and specialist growers in search of new or rare plants; and the flower-arranger looking for fresh material

In an age of supermarkets and garden-centres, many small nurseries are confining themselves to easily propagated plants giving a quick financial turn-over and an increasing number of large nurseries only maintain comprehensive catalogues by buying-in many items from wholesalers. The outcome will be that many excellent species, whose only commercial disadvantages are that they are not well-known or are slow to propagate, will no longer be offered by the trade, channels for the distribution of new introductions will become fewer and nursery catalogues will be reduced to a stereotyped monotony.

We propose to issue lists, annually, offering an ever-changing variety of new or uncommon plants from our already considerable collection. These will be set against a basic collection of hardy species and ground-cover plants, which we believe are essential for garden design and easy maintenance. Building-up stocks of the slower-growing species is a lengthy business but in the next few years we shall have available many, very rare and desirable alpines, several excellent new hybrid Hostas and Hellebores, additional variegated plants and grasses, and an increasing number of species of Paeonia, Rodgersia, Euphorbia, Bergenia and Kniphofia. Our stocks of bulbous species are too small to tempt the plantsman with at present but we shall have an extensive collection of Oncocyclus Irises ready later this year. We can only realise our plans if we have both the initial and continued support of keen growers. We can state with complete confidence that there is no other garden in the world which contains every species in this list. If you already have most of our plants, there is all the more reason to obtain those which you do not have!


